## **Speech**

International Conference on Child Participation in EU Decision Making Processes – May 2019

Organised by the Romanian Presidency of the Council of the European Union

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As a child, I wanted to change the world around me.

I had thoughts and ideas that I wanted to share with others,

but I had no way how to convey these to decision makers.

It was virtually impossible to be part of the policy-making

processes that affected me, as a child.

I was frustrated with these barriers that shaped the society I

was part of - so at age 16 I made a decision that would

shape my life, ..... and that of many around me.

I decided to go into politics.

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Little did I imagine, that that decision would bring me here

today, to address this very important summit, on behalf of

**Eurochild, as its President.** 

I wasn't the only child that felt ostracised, at that time.

I am sure that many adults my age, and even younger than I

am, who are present here today, can identify with this.

Unfortunately, today, many children continue to feel the

same today, and face the same challenges we have faced.

In real terms, there are virtually no adequate structures, that

incorporate child participation in the process of decision-

making.

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Where they exist they are still in their infancy, and on a

global scale, they are just a dream.

But meetings such as today's give me hope.

On behalf of Eurochild, I would like to congratulate Romania

for giving visibility to child participation during its

presidency of the European Council.

Congratulations for acknowledging the essential importance

of child participation and for organising the first-ever

Children's Summit under an official EU Presidency

programme.

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This initiative is a critical milestone in the history of the

European Union ..... especially ..... since it is being

organised during the week of the 'Future of Europe' summit

in Sibiu.

I am so pleased that the Romanian Presidency is

setting a precedent, which I hope, in the future, other

EU Presidencies, will build upon.

**Eurochild, and all of its 176 member organisations, want this** 

summit to be the first step of many.

**Eurochild would like to encourage all of Europe to reach out** 

to all children, from all different backgrounds.

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The right of Children to participate is key to achieving access

to all of their rights: such as protection from violence; from

poverty and discrimination; and, tackling today's

environmental challenges, amongst others.

Fundamentally, child participation is key for our children to

gain their rightful dignity.

Children are agents of change, in their own lives, the

lives of our communities, our countries and our world.

Therefore, it is essential that the European Union listens to

children, and ensures that children can influence decisions

that directly affect them, and all of us.

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Child participation in decision-making needs to gain

traction.

Child participation must be recognised as fundamental, for

children to ensure their full human dignity, their healthy

development, and their holistic wellbeing.

Child participation is a two-way street, which benefits, not

only the children but also society at large.

Through the work of Eurochild, we have witnessed, and are

still witnessing this dynamic.

We have experienced and still experience, first-hand, the

benefits of child participation.

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Our children's council within Eurochild, gives this amazing

organisation, incredible added value.

Their contributions inspire and inform our work. We are

convinced that without the children's input we will definitely

not be as comprehensive and effective.

However, although the benefits of child participation

become immediately evident, we must admit, that there are

still many challenges.

Unfortunately, cultural attitudes that exist, view children, as

passive, rather than active contributors to our societies.

The paternalistic mentality, which is still present, many a

time overprotects children, rather than help them reach their

full potential.

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Such cultural attitudes and paternalistic mentalities must be

overcome. Our plans to establish child participation, as an

integral part of a structured ongoing process, to empower

our children to become active citizens, critical thinkers and

contributors to our societies, cannot continue to be

hindered.

Children are game changers.

Children have the potential to be effective, and most

essential contributors.

Let's be the generation to unleash this potential for the

benefit of our human family.

However, we must ensure, that we do not opt for tokenism,

instead of meaningful, and purposeful child participation

processes.

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To truly achieve this, we need the political will of our

politicians, authorities and decision makers.

Then, we need to adopt a comprehensive approach, that

ensures inclusion and equality for all.

We need to determine how child participation

contributes towards the development of relevant

strategies, policy objectives, design and

implementation.

We also need to make sure, that these determinants

are optimised, so that the input from children is used

in the best possible way.

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I am sure that you all realise, that we are at a critical juncture,

in child participation history.

Child activists like Greta Thunberg; Malala Yousafzai; the

'March for Our Lives' ..... the student-led demonstrations in

support of stronger gun violence prevention measures; the

youth climate change protests and other instances of

children and youth activism in our times, are highlighting the

added that child participation brings to our value

communities, countries and our world.

Child participation strengthens democracy.

participation instils in children the necessary Child

empowerment, resilience, knowledge and insight to strive

for the wellbeing of our societies.

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Child participation will also better equip our children, to

engage with political actors.

Child participation will secure the take-up of decision-

making positions, and leadership roles for our children, as

second to nature.

In a world which has become so uncertain ..... where

humanity has become so suspicious, we need wise and astute

leadership.

We need our children to be resilient, wise and determined to

lead, to overcome the challenges, and to be innovative.

Children will definitely become active citizens, that bank on

critical thinking to challenge norms, and to bring about the

much-needed, ongoing, positive change.

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Child participation is the proactive approach that

keeps our societies relevant for today and tomorrow.

We must not think of our children as the future. They

are also our present, as fellow citizens and our

present, valued contributors.

Child participation in decision-making, needs to

become a reality today and not in the future.

Governments are obliged to move in this direction.

With almost universal ratification of the UN Convention on

the Rights of the Child, governments have a duty to ensure

that children and young people's voices are heard, and their

views acted upon.

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This convention may have been ratified by all EU member

states, but we must question the real progress we actually

made in this respect.

Therefore, we must ask ourselves: Did we truly fulfil this

obligation, or did we only scratch the surface in terms

of implementing our responsibility and our

commitment towards children's rights?

We need to be bold.

We need to be sincere.

We must ask ourselves: Have we done our duty

towards our children and the whole of our human

family?

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Eurochild hopes that other EU presidencies follow the

example set by the Romanian government and keep

children, and specifically child participation, firmly placed on

their agenda.

I urge our European family of nations to commit to this

responsibility, and place children's rights at the top of the

agenda ..... as the norm and not the exception.

**Every forthcoming EU presidency should have the political** 

will, to organise similar conferences and events, to keep

reminding us adults of our commitments, and obligations

towards our children.

I urge our authorities to keep themselves on their toes, to

carry their responsibility towards our children effectively.

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I truly dream that we can work together, to make

Europe the model of child participation, for other

regions of the world to follow.

We already know the way.

Guidelines on how to ensure child participation do exist and

are accessible.

Let's build on the positive experiences of child participation

that already exist all across Europe.

Last year's Eurochild conference in Opatija, organised

together with children, was just one example.

Undoubtedly, during this summit, we will hear other good

practices from the national level. The European Union is not

new to dialogue. It has organised a structured dialogue for

young people, which we can learn so much from.

However, Eurochild would like to see future Trio

Presidencies taking more systematic steps to involve

children ..... asking what matters to them ..... and debating

issues so that children will make meaningful contributions to

policies.

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Let me also take this opportunity, on behalf of Eurochild, to

acknowledge the important work of UNICEF; the European

Parliament Intergroup on Children's Rights (in particular

Anna-Maria Corazza Bildt as child rights coordinator); The

Learning 4 Wellbeing Foundation and its ground-breaking

work in facilitating dialogue between children and adults,

and all the children's rights communities at international,

national and community level.

All this shows us that we truly know the way.

We have the experience ..... and we have the expertise .....

and we have the wisdom of our children.

In this important year of change in our European Union, we

must celebrate what we have achieved together.

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We must reinforce each other's efforts to ensure our next

**European leaders harness the extraordinary energy and clear** 

ideas, that come from involving and engaging children in

our work.

The upcoming elections of the European Parliament will thus

be a critical moment for us Europeans.

We need to elect representatives that believe in

children's rights and child participation in EU decision

making.

In this regard, initiatives like the #VoteforChildren coalition

campaign are of significant importance.

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Children's rights organisations joined forces to recruit a new

generation of MEPs to become 'Child Rights Champions' to

protect and defend children's rights.

These candidates have pledged to listen to children's voices,

involve them in decisions affecting them, and act on

children's views.

Therefore, I urge all Europeans, voting in the upcoming

European Parliament Elections, to vote for Child Rights'

Champions.

Research on child participation in policy development has

been undertaken, and a number of salient recurring

indicators emerge.

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At the heart of this exercise, are children's rights and a

comprehensive approach that seek to champion true and

effective child participation.

As key decision makers and political actors, we came here

today, to reaffirm our support. However, the real work

continues, when we return to our countries.

It is time for decision.

Europe is at a most important historical juncture.

Let's invest in a Europe that is truly living its values

today and laying the foundations for tomorrow ......

for a Europe that includes, and that works, for the

dignity of all.

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We must elect policy makers that believe in children and

young people.

We must also reach out to all children, and to all young

people from whichever social groups they may come from.

We must, in particular, keep central to our vision, those

children that come from socially-excluded groups.

We must instil a social, economic and legal environment that

promotes children and young people's participation.

Consultation with children, needs to employ a variety of

approaches, as this ensures that children who use different

styles of communication are included.

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This consultation must take place in child-friendly safe

environments.

Policy-makers need to ask the children for recommendations

on what helps them to participate effectively as children.

Children themselves are the experts on their own

participation.

Let's bring them to the tables with us.

Let's give them their rightful place.

Professional training must be given to adults tasked with

securing child participation in decision making and policy

development.

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Dedicated programmes aimed at educating children about

their right to participate are also critical.

The children's declaration that will be adopted at this

summit, which includes such programmes, should also help

to develop, and empower, the children with the necessary

participation skills.

Our commitments to children's rights have been made,

decades ago.

The 30-year-old UN Convention on the Rights of the Child

enshrines our responsibility to make sure that children

participate in decisions which influence their lives.

The EU Charter of Fundamental Rights also reaffirms this.

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On the other hand, in the context of the 2030 Agenda,

children's participation is crucial for the successful

implementation of the SDGs and for achieving a sustainable

future for all.

We need to walk the talk!

The time has come to effectively implement these

commitments and to translate them into an inclusive

approach that gives children what is rightfully theirs.

Our politicians and our authorities can make all this happen.

Let's make this year a special year. Let's truly celebrate

the 30<sup>th</sup> Anniversary of the CRC.

On concluding, I now wish to address myself to our children

present here.

Dear children, please remember that you have a right to

make your voice heard and a right to be listened to.

These are rights that are yours, and that no one can take

them away from you.

Every single one of you has something to offer, and we are

here today to make sure that you achieve these goals.

Please be the agents of change, to our world.

Our Europe needs you.

Our World Needs You.

Our Human Family needs you.

We need you to be our activists.

We need you to be our effective leaders, of our nations tomorrow.

You are our hope, for inclusion, for equality, for social justice, and peace.
