For this reason, I am convinced that we must do more to invest, as a country but also as a region and as one world, to inspire our young people to be the successful entrepreneurs and the inspiring leaders of tomorrow.

Ultimately, the work that we do, to make ourselves better citizens and better individuals, is also a way of building resilience, and prioritising the wellbeing of our societies, and our world.

Self-development is a reflection of social development, because, when we change ourselves, we are changing our world.

Encouraging our young people to participate in areas of social and economic innovation is, therefore, a crucial contribution to the positive development of our democracies, and our European way of life.

Young entrepreneurs, can build a legacy of innovation, which is fundamental for the resilience of our societies.

This is why the European Commission itself has recognised JAYE as a best practice in the sector, because it offers educational excellence in the area of entrepreneurship.
